Andrew Yang is an American businessman and politician. Originally a lawyer, Yang began working in startups and early stage growth companies as a founder & executive during the 2000s. In 2011, he founded Venture for America, a nonprofit focused on creating jobs in cities struggling to recover from the Great Recession. He ran in the 2020 Democratic presidential primaries, becoming known for his "Freedom Dividend, a universal basic income (UBI) of \$1,000 a month to every American adult as a response to job displacement by automation, going from a relative unknown to a major competitor in the race who participated in seven of the first eight Democratic debates.

The son of immigrants from Taiwan, Yang was born and raised in New York State. He attended Brown University and Columbia Law School. Although he has not voted in a municipal election since 2001, he has lived in New York City since graduating from college. Yang formally announced his bid for Mayor in January 2021, quickly becoming a frontrunner.

### Candidate's Platform

- 1. Supportive: In addition to committing \$4 billion dollars a year to building 30,000 housing units a year, Yang has also decided to roll back mandatory parking minimums, legalize single room occupancy buildings (otherwise known as SRO's and ADUs), overhaul uniform land use review price to quickly approve adorable developments, and launch "New Housing New York plan" (NHNY25). NHNY25 aims to use hotels that will no longer serve as hotels to create 25,000 more housing units. - 2. Unclear: While Yang has tweeted about his support for cash transfer programs, his policies do not indicate the integration of that approval into application. Under Yang's policy on LGBTQ+ youth, he has indicated that he will support providing a basic income for youth who live independently. Details on this process however remain unclear as Yang only intends on supporting 500K New Yorkers indicating the most need while meeting the "criteria" to attain this funding. Furthermore the program is not targeted at youth. New Yorkers will be given an amount that results in \$2K a year in additional income while coming from philanthropic donations from public and private institutions. The details behind this

- 2. **Unclear:** Andrew Yang has not indicated a stance on social-emotional learning. Yang has however stated that he will support after-school bridge programming to help struggling students, English language learners, special needs students, and students with learning disabilities to catch up once schools are fully reopened, and will offer Pre-K programs to 3 year-olds (3-K)
- 3. Supportive: The Yang Campaign has indicated support for expanding civics education in schools in order to combat voter misinformation, but has not provided any set course of action in conjunction with this goal. He has also expressed support for lowering the voting age to 16. Yang has previously indicated a commitment to teaching life skills such as financial literacy in k-12 schools during his presidential campaign but has not since reaffirmed these sentiments for his mayoral race.

- 3. **Supportive:** Yang has indicated his disdain for the Deblasio administration's decision to decrease funding in sanitation and has committed to increasing the department's funding to pre 2020 levels (https://mobile.twitter.com/andrewyang/status/1375212813883478019?lang=en)
- 4. Supportive: The Yang Campaign has indicated that he wished to allocate more support and funding to the City Civic Engagement commission, which was established in 2018 to run a citywide participatory budgeting program with guidance from a PB advisory committee. - 5. Unsupportive: While Yang had initially indicated a desire to divest and reinvest funds from the NYPD, his ideas and policies contradict such sentiments. Yang wishes to promote a system that will encourage officers to document low level offenses that can then ultimately lead to an arrest. There are two issues with this. One being that officers can still lie regarding the incident being documented and two, documentation can be disregarded or "lost" should atrocities be inflicted upon civilians. Yang has also indicated that he wishes for the 250 member additional police to

subway stations become permanent.
Furthermore he has indicated that he is not willing to completely alter the current funding of the NYPD.

- 3. Not supportive: Yang has indicated a desire to reinstate in-person learning. While he wishes to expand the New York Teaching Fellows program and increase student access to technology, his choice to disapprove of the wishes of the largest union of teachers acts as a detriment to the idea of a "manageable workload." Earlier this year, Yang indicated that the slow pace of schools opening was due to the actions of the UFT and teachers that were reluctant to decrease the social-distancing of 6feet to 3feet in classrooms due to fear of outbreak stemming from overcrowding in the classroom. Yang has also demanded that all teachers that are fully vaccinated should be in schools.

YAY Census, ¼ of respondents experience homelessness. His affordable housing policies are something that the census covers.

-In our opinion, Andrew Yang is extremely supportive of improving the homes and communities of New York City. From analyzing his home and community policies, Yang will do everything in his power to ensure affordable housing based on his understanding that around 440,000 tenants call public housing home, and

44% of people living in market-rent apartments

are burdened.

- Yang's strongest area is bringing down the cost of living in the city and improving the public housing stock. Instead of New Yorkers overpaying for hotel rooms, Yang will take advantage of this and provide a <a href="mailto:short-term">short-term</a> solution with an eye towards providing transitional services that will help New Yorkers keep a roof over their heads.
- Yang's weakest area is the money he plans to spend: \$4 billion a year to build/preserve \$30,000 affordable annually. That's more than Mayor Bill de Blasio's record-high spending and not at all innovative.

- technology equity, admission reform, and 3-K In our opinion, Yang is somewhat supportive of addressing young people's school-related values, because he addresses some pressing issues, but could be more progressive in his stances (especially regarding admissions reform and desegregation) and more specific in his solutions (regarding bridge programming and technology equity)
- -His strongest area is COVID reopening plans because he offered a lot of evidence on how he plans to do this and why it is important. Yang plans to reduce NYC class sizes and add teachings in classrooms that need it, to add social workers and school counselors in schools with under-served and homeless populations.
- His weakest area is technology equity because he doesn't offer specifics on how he plans to expand the program.
- Yang also approves of the presence of specialized high schools and has determined the test to be equitable and fair in application. He wishes to create more specialized high schools, two in every borough. Yang's steadfast appreciation of the SHSAT is alarming and contributes to distrust in his education policies.

### Your Pockets & Future

 Andrew Yang's pocket and future policies heavily focus on ensuring young people who are born from a low income household to be able to have equal access to thrive in comparison to a higher income household.
